Evelyn Bryan Johnson turned 100 years old on Nov. 4, 2009. The **99s** are celebrating with her in many ways. On Tuesday, Evelyn Johnson was feted at a Warbird Fly-in at TRI airport.

On Wednesday, the day started with acknowledgement by Willard Scott on NBC's The Today Show.

Then the **Tennessee Chapter 99s** gave the first of several parties to honor her. This one was held at the Morristown, TN airport, her home field. We hosted a gathering from noon til 4:00 with a special cake, refreshments, and a guest book.

At 1:00 we had a banner "Happy 100th Birthday Evelyn Johnson from the TN 99s" towed past the airport and around the city. The **North Central Section** made an enormous, glittery birthday card for Evelyn (featured in several media photos). Kaye Combs-Moore, chair of the **Kentucky Bluegrass 99s** flew in from Kentucky. High flying local celebrates 100Th Birthday

MORRISTOWN, Tenn. (WVLT) -- She has dedicated her life in East Tennessee to what started as a hobby more than 50 years ago, but that soon turned into a passion for flying.

And, Wednesday, the woman known by many as "Mama Bird" celebrated a very special milestone

Volunteer TV has featured this high flying woman several times over the years. With awards, halls of fame inductions, even a world record, all because of her love for flying. And, that has not faded at all, as she celebrates her 100Th Birthday!5 days a week you can find Evelyn Bryan Johnson at the Moore-Murrell Airport in Morristown, still working as the operator of the small air-field."For many years, like 50 of them, at least, I'd come everyday, 7days a week," she said. But before her decades in the air, her husband enlisted in the Air Force, days after the bombing of Pearl Harbor. Left to run their dry cleaning business, the long days left her wanting to get away from it all, and a newspaper served as her guide. "It was about a 3 inch square and it simply said learn to fly, well I said that's for me, that's what I'll do," she said as she smiles. She got her license to fly privately in 1944 and worked for several years to reach new levels of flight, until Mama Bird started teaching others. "So, I thought I'll just get an instructor rating, and teach people to fly, never realizing I would enjoy it so much," she added. Each year her former students gather for her Birthday, as they all celebrate the passion that has inspired."It was love at first flight, and about 65 years later, which is along in now, it still is."Over the years, Evelyn has won awards, been inducted into several halls of fame, and she still holds the world record for the most flight hours of any woman, at nearly 60,000. All of which is her secret to reaching triple-digits. "Doing what you like to do, enjoying your work, staying in good health," and she added, "Just be as happy as you can. "Evelyn hasn't piloted a plane in about 3 years because of her health, but she still rides whenever she can. 




Georgia Chapter

Three separate Awards of Achievement may be presented each year. The three awards are:

- a. The <u>Award of Achievement for Contributions to The Ninety-Nines</u> which recognizes a significant contribution to the mission of the 99s or any of the organization's activities.
- b. The <u>Award of Achievement for Contributions to Aviation</u> which recognizes significant contributions to any facet of aviation, such as aviation/aerospace education, aviation science, aviation history, aviation commerce, aviation legislation, etc.
- c. The <u>Award of Achievement for Humanitarian Efforts</u> which recognizes significant contribution, through aviation, in a humanitarian effort.

In addition, two other awards may be presented to "non-99s." The first one, the <u>George Palmer Putnam Award</u>, is given in recognition of support of The 99s. The other award, the <u>Award of Merit</u>, is given to recognize a contribution(s) made to aviation in general. Each of these awards may be presented to an individual or an organization. Individual winners may be male or female.

The nominating requirements are very simple. Each nomination should be a one-page letter and should include the name, address, and phone number of the nominee (or the nominee's next of kin, if the nominee is deceased). Three additional pages of substantiating material (resume, newspaper articles, letters of endorsement, etc.) may be attached.

Don't delay! The January 15th deadline for submitting Award nominations is just around the corner!

2010 Calendar Celebrates the History of Women in Aviation Commemorates 100th Anniversary of America's First Female Pilot

December 9, 2009, Aurora, Colorado – *This Day in Women's Aviation*, a page-a-day calendar published by Powder Puff Pilot, marks the accomplishments made by women in the decidedly man's world of aviation. Each page highlights an event, milestone, or triumph won in a field that often banned or discouraged the participation of women.

Entries span three centuries—from balloonists of the early 1800s to the astronauts and military heroines of today. A wide range of aviation endeavors are recognized—glider pilots, the Women Airforce Service Pilots (WASP) of World War II, airplane designers, flight attendants, parachutists, educators, and the "Mercury 13," the secret female-astronaut testing program of the 1960s. The oldest woman referenced is 99-year-old Hildegarde Ferrara, who, in 1996, tandem-jumped with an instructor to become the oldest person to parachute from a plane. The youngest is 7-year-old Jessica Dubroff, who died in a crash that same year attempting to become the youngest person to fly across the U.S.

Though the entries are America-centric, there are many that applaud the accomplishments of women around the world, such as Russian Marina Solovyeva who, in 1966, set a new women's airspeed record of 1,270 mph; and Australian Linda Corbould, who planned and commanded a night mission into Baghdad during the 2003 invasion of Iraq.

The cover of *This Day in Women's Aviation* features a photo of Betty Scott, the American adventurer often credited as the first woman in the U.S. to fly solo. Famed airplane designer Glenn Curtiss, founder of the first U.S. airplane manufacturing company in 1907, reluctantly took on Betty as his protégé. As was his usual practice, he inserted a block of wood behind the throttle pedal of his 35-

horsepower Curtiss pusher to prevent students from inadvertently taking off while taxiing down the field. By some reports, Betty conspired with a mechanic to remove the throttle block and on September 6, 1910, took flight in Hammondsport, New York up to 40 feet high. Those who insist that Betty's flight was unintentional instead credit Bessica Raiche as America's first flyer. She was a dentist who, within weeks of Betty's flight, flew solo with full intention. Regardless of who flew first, women would not be denied their place in the air.

This Day in Women's Aviation reminds us of the setbacks and discrimination these aviation pioneers endured, and honors those who attained their dreams in spite of them.
