Southeast Section Member celebrates 60 years in The 99s!

Georgiana McConnell had her sixtieth anniversary of being a 99 on 1 November 2011. Georgiana earned her pilot's license at age 18, in 1943. She followed the footsteps of her Uncle, a Tennessee National Guardsman for whom the former Nashville Airport was named (McConnell Field). In the 1940's and 1950's, many high schools and colleges added aviation classes to their curricula. After the US entered WWII, Georgian took the aviation course offered at her high school during her senior year. This class helped to allure her to flying. She joined the Civil Air Patrol. Civil Air Patrol members could take advantage of group lessons to get flight training and airtime. The CAP also offered ground school, the classroom education required to receive aviation ratings (certificate of advanced skills). Some squadrons found ways to extend their flying instruction beyond the official training exercise. Georgiana remembered that members of the Nashville chapter formed a club to buy a Piper Cub and took turns flying it to accumulate hours and experience.

In the 1960's the Lovelace Clinic, in Arizona, was testing for astronauts. 45 woman rearranged their schedules to under go this testing. Georgiana had been working for 12 years at the same insurance agency, as a cashier, when she quit her job, to be one of those women. Of course, we all know what happened, none of those ladies were considered for the program. Today, Georgiana lives at Bordeaux Long Term Care Home in Nashville, TN. We want to say thank you for all you have done in your lifetime to inspire other women to do what you did or tried to do. Congratulations, Georgiana for your 60 years as a 99!
