- the 99s? (One of our section goals is to increase and retain members be part of the solution by talking about our organization and sharing your excitement about flying.)
- **4.** \*Challenge yourself.\* Learn something new, get a new rating, take a class. *I've heard it said that if you try one new thing per month, by the end of one year, you will be 12 times stronger.*
- 5. \*Inspire others.\* Invite a 99 who has never attended a Section Meeting or International Conference to attend. Being involved at the chapter level is a wonderful experience but attending a Section or International Meeting presents a more global view and knowledge about the 99s.
- 6. \*Serve others.\* Fly it Forward or Mentor a 99s sister. If you have your PPL, take a young girl flying so that she can experience the excitement of flight. If you are a CFI, mentor a 99 who is interested in pursuing additional ratings. If your strength is writing, write an article for the Flight Line or the 99s News. If it is easy for you to talk to others, volunteer at a community aviation outreach event. If you have excellent organization skills, take the lead on a Girl Scout Education Project. Think of other ways you may be able to use your strengths to serve your 99s chapter and section.

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7. \*Maximize the use of technology.\* For our young pilots, this is an easy goal. For our "more mature" pilots, this may be more of a challenge. Join our SE Section Facebook page – read and post your adventures. Peruse the SE Section website. Advertise your chapter's events on social media. If you can't attend a chapter or section meeting, join by Face Time or Skype. Generate excitement about us.

So, there you have 7 goals and I said keep it to a few. Which ones resonate with you and are attainable? As your Governor, my goal is to support you in the ways you need me – to communicate with you, to be the biggest cheerleader for the 99s, to be a positive role model, to contribute to your knowledge about flying, to build relationships with you, and to increase our membership. ## Maintenance 101

### Keeping Safe after Maintenance: Ask Questions

You drop your plane off with a maintenance shop for repairs or maybe an annual inspection.

You say to yourself, "it's in good hands and everything should be fine when I pick it up". Well, whether its a simple oil change or full blown inspection, you would like to and need to know what went on during the time when your plane is in another person's hands. We are taught before flight to perform a Pre-Flight Inspection. You do a general walk around according to the manufacture's POH handbook. Depending on the plane, some are quick and some may take some time to check each item stated in the POH. So what kind of pre-flight (or post-flight) should you do when you pick up your plane after its been in a maintenance shop?

When picking up the plane, it's always nice to meet with the person who actually worked on the plane and not just the owner of the company. You want to review what was done to the plane. He or she will have a list of items done to the plane during this time. Take the time to go through the list and ask questions. Even though you may not be a mechanic or know much about repairing airplanes, ask and you will learn something. Most mechanics are happy to explain what was done and how they completed the task. Be sure to collect the logbooks for the airplane, too. You will see a log entry for each book, airframe, engine, and propeller. You can check to see that the sign off is complete, including a description of the work done. After this, do a general walk around of the airplane. Do this with the mechanic to be sure it's the way you brought it to them with no "extra" damage. You may or may not have questions during this period, but he or she might want to explain any repairs done to the airplane. Its a good idea to visit the shop while the work is being performed so you can see observe and learn more about your airplane. The more you know about the inner workings, the better you can deal with emergencies if they occur.

Usually the next step is a "Maintenance Test Flight". This is to confirm the work completed in the shop is

satisfactory. Be sure to do your recommended preflight according to the POH.

I always recommend to take extra time during the run up to double check the engine gauges, mag check, propeller check, etc. Feel free to do it twice to be sure everything is per the POH.

After this is completed, it is a good idea to have time to fly the airplane in the local area and return to the airport to double check the airplane over. It's not wise to show up with baggage and plan a long cross-country right after any maintenance. Take the time to make sure everything is in working order and safe. If a problem develops on the flight, you can return to the airport and have the mechanic take care of the problem.

If you had an oil change done, be sure that oil has been serviced back into the engine at the correct level according to the POH. If you had a tire change done, be sure it's inflated to the proper psi according to the POH.

You notice I will reference you to the POH for information. As a pilot, it's a great "go to" book for the airplane you are flying. It will list Pre-flight procedures, emergency procedures, general aircraft information (Oil level and type, Tire psi, etc.). Read it, learn it, love it!

I have personally picked up many airplanes for delivery from factory new planes, paint shops, and maintenance shops. I have caught many items not correct, from paper left in the plane after painting to turn buckles not safety wired on factory new planes. There are many good shops who keep you flying safely. You just need to be prepared to ask questions and ask to be shown. After the "Maintenance Test Flight", you will be ready to enjoy the airplane on that cross-country flight with friends and family.

Wendy Rose, an Alabama resident, never thought of learning to fly before she heard of the First to Solo™ Challenge. Instead, she focused on giving opportunities to her daughter, Dana, who dreams of becoming an astronaut. It was her husband who learned about Women Of Aviation Worldwide Week and the First to Solo™ Challenge in early 2015 who suggested that she take on the challenge.

"I wasn't sure at first. However, I decided to set my goal on becoming a pilot and fly my little girl high in the sky, to be closer to the stars, until she can get there and higher on her own," said Rose.

Seven weeks after her first small aircraft flight experience, Rose became the first woman among eligible First to Solo<sup>TM</sup> Challenge candidates to solo. She won \$1,500 in flight training cash and a Sennheiser headset. She now wants to become a flight instructor.

In 2016, iWOAW will offer flight training cash to two additional eligible women who solo promptly after a discovering flight during Women Of Aviation Worldwide Week March 7 – 13. #### **WASP Bee Haydu Earns Doctorate**

February 2014 found a collection of 99s and other aviation professionals gathering for career day for the "No Limits Girls Aviation Program" hosted by Aviation Adventures, Inc. In Mobile, AL. The highlight of career day is a presentation by WASP, Bernice "Bee" Haydu. Bee joins us each year to talk to girls from the underserved communities to tell them about her early life and how she earned her WASP wings, then about her lifelong career in aviation.

In response to a question, Bee responded that her one regret in life is that she was never able to go to college and get a degree. Enter 99 Deb Henneberry, from Vaughn Aviation College. Deb was horrified that one of our national treasures, one of our heroes, was never able

to complete her dream of a college degree.



Deb returned home with a mission: it was time for Bee to realize her dream. Deb made some phone calls and got to work. In May 2015, in an auditorium full of friends, family and 99s, Bee was awarded an honorary doctorate degree recognizing her lifelong contributions to the aviation industry. At the age of 94, Bee Haydu realized her dream of a college degree. Bee proved once again: never give up on your dreams and never underestimate the power of our wonderful 99s organization. We are proud of you, Bee, and honored that you are a 99!

#### FL Spaceport – Celebrating 50 years

The Spaceport 99s, a local chapter of the Ninety-Nines (The International Organization of Women Pilots), gathered on Dec 5<sup>th</sup> to celebrate their 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. The Spaceport chapter was chartered in 1965 by thirteen women who were pilots and loved to fly. Now, 50 years later there are sixty-four members.

The Ninety-Nines is a worldwide organization of about 5000 women pilots, established in 1929 by 99 licensed women pilots, that promotes advancement of aviation through education, scholarships, and

mutual support while honoring our unique history and sharing our passion for flight. The first president was Amelia Earhart. Special members in attendance at this celebration were charter member Ann Conway, and Nancy El-Hajj, who now in her eighties, has logged over 14,000 hours as a pilot and is still an FAA examiner flying regularly. Three others, Chairman Donna Wilt, a professor at Florida Institute of Technology, Naiara Petralanda, and Virginie Rollin, professors at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University in

#### <u> Alabama – Amelia Earhart Luncheon</u>

The Alabama 99s will be hosting the 20th Annual Amelia Earhart Luncheon on January 30th at the Southern Museum of Flight in Birmingham, Alabama at 11am. The guest speaker will be Mary Alice Beatty Carmichael, daughter of aviator and writer, Mary Alice Beatty. In 1931, Mary Alice Beatty and her husband, Donald, flew a scientific expedition over the Andes Mountains to find a better route for flights in South America for the airlines. Later in life, Mary Alice established a museum at Samford University in Birmingham, AL that would grow into the Southern Museum of Flight. Both Mary Alice and Donald were installed in the Alabama Aviation Hall of Fame and remain the only husband-wife couple to receive the honor. Mary Alice was a charter member and the only women in the OX5 Aviation Pioneers, Alabama Wings, and both were charter members of the National Aviation Hall of Fame in Dayton, Ohio. Mary Alice wrote *To Love the Sky* in 1986 and her daughter, Mary Alice Beatty Carmichael, has had it republished with additional stories that were edited out of the original edition. Mrs. Carmichael will be talking about her mother's adventures and her love of aviation.
