And sure enough, it was wildly successful.

NOLA 99s Happenings: April 2018









On March 23rd Allie Smith passed her SIC EMB-120 while in training for Ameriflight. She is now doing her Initial Operating Experience (IOE) in Puerto Rico and other islands of the Caribbean. She reports that line employees are stunned when a woman steps out of the cockpit.

On February 19th Alice Furr (aka Baby Alice) received her Commercial Pilot Airplane Single and Multiengine Land ratings. On April 3rd she received her first type rating for SIC HS-125 Instrument Airplane. On April 5th she took someone on a photo flight, her first official paid flight. Baby Alice was just notified that she will receive an AE Scholarship for Instructor training. She was 1 of 20 winners and the only one from the SE Section.

On April 7th five members of NOLA toured the Lakefront Airport (KNEW) tower and the Louis Armstrong International Airport (MSY) tower/TRACON.

On March 9 and 10 the chapter sponsored a Fly It Forward event as part of the Institute for Women of Aviation Worldwide (iWOAW) worldwide week at Louisiana Regional Airport (KREG). Registration filled up as quickly as it was opened up. One hundred ten girls/women were given their 1st flight over the 2 day event. A bus load of 20 6th grade girls came on Friday. Four members flew the girls along with other volunteer pilots. Fourteen members and 49 ½ 's helped with ground support. Among the ground support was a member, Madison Perry, who has been awarded a Fly Now Scholarship. She was first introduced to aviation through a Fly It Forward flight at KREG and is now pursuing a career in aviation at a Louisiana college. A new web site for the chapter, NOLA99s.com, went live in February due to the concentrated effort of Janet Gonzales and Lisa Cotham.

Fly it Forward Team Work!

The Girl Scout Aviation Education Day (Fly it Forward) was hosted by the FL Goldcoast, Treasure Coast, and FL Heartland 99s Chapters. The STEM event was held on March 24, 3018 at Wayman Aviation at KHWO in Pembroke Pines, FL. The 99s were supported by Florida Aero Club, EAA, and OBAP, and inspired more than 100 Girl Scouts and their parents to consider aviation careers as an option. The girls rotated through ten interesting and fast-paced stations to learn about aviation.

- Our chapter is growing steadily with 32 members! We did our first compass rose painting on November 3rd in Williston, FL. On this occasion, our chapter (along with other FL chapters) was trained by Laura Sherwood (Spaceport) so that we could do future roses on our own. We had 16 volunteers, most of them showing up by airplane. We were efficient, starting at 8am and ending around 3pm. The Spaceport chapter donated all their airmarking tools to our chapter.
- Naiara (co-chair), put her training in practice in March to help the Paradise coast chapter lay out their rose in Fort Myers.
- We had our first online meeting in December, using zoom. After figuring out some of the technical details, we were able to conduct our meeting using the 40 min for free. This will be done again in the future as needed.
- On March 31st, the chapter met in Leesburg at Naiara's place. She shared her backcountry flying experience from last summer with us, explaining how to do a perfect short field landing when you only have a few hundred feet of runway with no go-around option. After a lunch cooked by her 49.5 Grant, Naiara took our members and guests for tours in her Just SuperSTOL to try some of the techniques she described in the morning: box canyon turn and spot landing. We also decided on a schedule for most of the remaining year (and then some), with planning for seaplane introduction in May, a fundraiser in November, and more compass rose paintings in early 2019.
- The Daytona 99s family is growing, with the addition of Virginie Rollin's baby Arthur in February, and the future addition of Lauren Thompson's baby in June/July.
- With that, Virginie also gave the Mommy Pilots' "Flying with Kids" seminar along with Ramona Banks at Sun N Fun."

The Appalachian Aviatrixes Hosted Its First Girl Scout Fun Patch Day

<u>Tri-City Aviation</u>, a general aviation fixed-base operator and the Appalachian Aviatrixes, a chapter of <u>The Ninety-Nines</u>, an international organization of women pilots which promotes the advancement of aviation through education and scholarships hosted their first Girl Scout Fun Patch Day on Saturday, April 7 at the <u>Tri-Cities Airport</u> in Blountville, Tennessee.

Eighty-Five <u>Girl Scouts</u>, parents, and leaders were immersed into a half-day of aviation learning. Presentations made by an all-female cast included the steps to preflighting an airplane, the advantages and rewards of becoming a certified flight instructor, the ins and outs of a hot air balloon, and the function of the Civil Air Patrol.

Participates were introduced to Ballard Health Air Transport flight nurses and the role of a flying nurse. Representatives from the Transportation Security Administration explained the importance of airport security. Plus, a Beechcraft T-6 Texan II and a Cessna Citation and five female instructors were sent to the event by the Columbus Air Force base located in Columbus, Mississippi.

Girl Scouts ranging in ages from eight to fourteen received foam gliders, pens, coloring books, crayons, aviation career information, embroidered Appalachian Aviatrix fun patches, and the recently published book, *The Aviatrix: Fly Like a*

Our chapter has slowly been pulling ourselves together as an official 99s chapter. We were happy and grateful to have a chapter member's business donate the remaining money we needed to offer a \$1000 Mommy Pilots scholarship for 2018, as part of the 99s Scholarship Registry. In February, we co-hosted with the Alabama and Mississippi Chapters and the Columbus AFB a class for military pilot & student pilot spouses called, "Specialized Undergraduate Pilot Training and Flying Demystified". At the end of February, we had our first guest speaker, Phil Poeppelman, who talked about flying the Air Force's Deep Freeze Missions to Antarctica to include the first Night Vision Goggle approaches. It was a successful presentation however we have a few issues to iron out with using the application Zoom in such a format. In March, we took a hard look at our chapter and how to deal with the busyness of our members, our members being spread out across multiple time zones, and the challenges of being an online chapter.

We also decided we needed to refocus back to supporting moms. We have a password protected members section of our website we just launched that is still under construction, however, we now have a member map, a chapter calendar, important contact information, a sign up for Mommy Pilot Guides (an informal mentorship), etc. We are trying a different format for our business meetings which will be based out of Google Classroom and are spread out over a week to allow for each member to take the time to participate in the meeting on her own schedule. We are using our Zoom account, a video conferencing application, for emergency business meetings, guest speakers, and now hangar chats. The hangar chats are to allow our chapter members and other 99s face time with each other and to network. We also pick a topic prior to each hangar chat that we feel is a current issue for us as moms, women, and/or pilots. We had our first trial run of a hangar chat in March where we discussed our biggest obstacle/challenge facing us right now with flying. We also started a chapter member GroupMe group to stay in contact, ask questions, schedule meetups locally or while on a trip. This has been a great way to share stories, pictures, etc informally especially since we can't meet in person. We just finished up a successful bonfire.com Mommy Pilots Chapter shirt fundraiser. This will allow us to pay some of the bills for the chapter.

We also launched a graphic contest. The winning design will be used on merchandise to help us raise money for our chapter and scholarship. It runs from March 31 - May 31. Please see attached flyer. This month, Virginie Rollins and Ramona Banks presented our Flying with Kids seminar here at Sun n Fun.
